

Lesson Opening & Creating Interest:

Lesson Body:

The days following Jesus' crucifixion were cloaked in grief, confusion, and silence. For the disciples, it felt as though the sun had set on everything they had come to believe. For three years, they had followed Jesus—seen His miracles, heard His parables, and dared to hope that He was the promised Messiah. They had witnessed the blind receiving sight, the dead rising, and sinners forgiven with a word. Every step they took with Him had been a step into light. But now, that light seemed extinguished by the darkness of the Cross. Their Lord had been arrested, humiliated, crucified, and buried. And in the echo of His final cry—"It is finished"—their world had collapsed.

Behind closed doors and locked hearts, the disciples hid. Fear clung to them like a shadow. What would happen to them? Would the authorities come for them next? Had they been wrong to believe? Their hope was buried in the tomb with Christ.

But then came the dawn of a new day. A miracle so profound that it shook the earth and eternity alike: Jesus Christ rose from the dead. The grave could not hold Him. Death could not defeat Him. The silence of the tomb was shattered by the voice of the Risen One.

He appeared first to Mary Magdalene, then to the women, to the disciples on the road to Emmaus, and eventually to the very ones who had fled in fear. He entered their locked room—not with rebuke or wrath—but with a gift: "Peace be with you." It was more than a greeting. It was a healing. A declaration. A new beginning.

He showed them His hands and side—not to shame them for running, but to restore their broken trust. These wounds were no longer signs of death, but signs of victory. Sorrow turned into joy. Confusion gave way to clarity. Fear melted into faith. Jesus was alive. And everything would be different because of it.

Yet one was missing: Thomas, the twin. When he heard the others say they had seen the Lord, he couldn't accept it. Perhaps he was protecting himself from more heartbreak. Perhaps his grief was too deep. "Unless I see the marks of the nails in His hands," Thomas said, "I will not believe."

Jesus returned again—this time, for Thomas. Not to scold, but to gently invite him into faith. "Place your finger here... Do not be unbelieving, but believing." And in that holy moment, Thomas gave one of the most profound confessions in all of Scripture: "My Lord and my God!" It wasn't just belief in a miracle—it was surrender to a person.

This story of Thomas is not merely about doubt—it's about Christ's mercy. It's about how He meets us even in our hesitation. It reminds us that Jesus does not turn away from those who question. Instead, He steps toward us, speaks peace, and invites us to come closer.

Like Thomas, we, too, wrestle with questions:

"Is God truly near?"

"Why is there suffering?"

"Why does He feel silent?"

But our Lord doesn't demand perfect faith. He offers His wounds and His peace. And He says, "Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have believed." That includes us.

The peace that Christ offers is not mere comfort—it is strength. It is courage. It is the presence of God that emboldens us to go out and live boldly, even in a world that still nails truth to a cross. The disciples, once trembling behind closed doors, became messengers of the resurrection, unafraid to proclaim what they had seen and experienced—even at great cost.

In the Armenian Badarak, this peace is not just remembered—it is shared:

խաղաղութիւն ամենեցուն – Khaghaghootyoon amenetsoon – "Peace unto all."

These are not symbolic words—they are Christ's very peace, offered again to His people, through the Church. Just as He entered the room of the disciples, He enters our midst in every Divine Liturgy. He gives Himself in the Body and Blood, He speaks through the sacred hymns, and He reveals Himself in the prayers of the Church. The faith of the Armenian Church is not built merely on what was seen in the past, but on what is experienced now, in the mystery of the resurrection.

The Church does not only teach about Christ. She offers Christ. Not as an idea or distant memory, but as the Living God, risen and glorified, ever-present and ever-near.

So when we gather around the altar, when we receive the sacraments, when we hear the words, "Peace be with you all," let us remember—we are like those disciples. And Christ is here. He breathes peace into our fears and calls us to go forth with joy, saying: "As the Father has sent Me, so I send you." (John 20:21)

Let us go forth as witnesses—not just of what we believe, but of Whom we have encountered.
